The Remains of a UFO Were Recovered...

...in Roswell, New Mexico, Harry Truman was President, Otto Graham led the Cleveland Browns to the AAFC Conference Title, and the first football game was played in North Canton Memorial Stadium.

The year was 1947.

Memorial Stadium was dedicated to soldiers from North Canton who fought in any U.S. conflict.

North Canton beat Central Catholic, 19-12, in that first game at the new stadium, embarking on the school's first unbeaten season.

The stadium boasted some exclusives that many other Stark County stadiums would have loved to have had. These included covered home stands and state-of-the-art

lighting, which may not sound too technical in today's world, but this was 75 years ago.

While the stadium grandstand has always been a very special place, filled with memories of friends, family, classmates, and past victories on the gridiron, after years of additions and repairs the time has finally come to replace the structure with a new Grandstand that has been designed to be safer and much more accessible.

A comprehensive Athletic Facilities Master Plan and Legacy Campaign was launched in 2017 to update and expand the complex, turning it into a state-of-the-art facility. Approximately \$3.0 million

dollars of donations have been raised, with the total of projects completed to date being \$2.7 million. These projects have been completed through community donations without using any tax dollars.

Projects already completed include:

- Paving the East parking lot of Memorial Stadium.
- Turf installation for the Soccer and Lacrosse Stadium.
- The addition of a new Grandstand at the Softball Stadium.
- A new building with locker rooms and an attached concession stand adjacent to the Soccer and Lacrosse fields.

Projects underway include:

- The new West Grandstand with additional handrails, widened aisle ways, wheelchair and companion seating, an enlarged press box area, improved restrooms, and an

Martha Strauch Bell



Marty Bell has spent her lifetime doing what she urges others to do: “Continue to love and share and appreciate the arts.” For that and for her efforts teaching students to love music, Mayor Matt Starr of Mt. Vernon, Ohio, has said, “anybody who creates art makes the community that much more special.”

Marty was born to Bolton and Martha Strauch in Canton, Ohio. She is the youngest of 6 children to graduate from North Canton City Schools. She attended Portage Elementary School where she was off to a great start with first grade

teacher Mrs. Betty Bradshaw, 7th grade at the Portage Street building, 8th and 9th grades at the Junior High on Charlotte St., and grades 10-12 at Hoover High. Marty spent much of her junior high and high school years involved in choir under directors Dorothy DeFine, Harry Mason, and John Hayward and studied piano under Charlotte Mathias. She performed in West Side Story, South Pacific, and Li'l Abner at Hoover. She carried several of the traditions of Hoover's choirs into her teaching career including May Fiesta, The Way You Look Tonight, the Old Routine, and Bye Neighbor. She graduated in 1985.

After graduation, Marty attended Bowling Green State University and graduated in 1989 with a degree in Music Education. She began her career as the Middle and High School choir director at Highland Local Schools in Morrow County where she remained for 10 years. In 1999, she took her talents to Mt. Vernon City Schools where

she served as the Middle and High School choir director for 22 years until her retirement in 2021. While there, she developed the “Sounds of the Season” holiday music program for students in grades 7-12 and a “May Fiesta” for student soloists, ensembles and choirs.

Marty did not limit her efforts by focusing on only the community's youth. She has branched out to other performing arts opportunities in Knox County. She has also been the director of Mt. Vernon's Heritage Singers, a 14 voice a'capella group of adults, since 2005. She facilitated the Youth School for Mime Theater Summer Workshop at Kenyon College for 10 years. Additionally, she has performed with the Mount Vernon Players, Bruce Jacklin and Co., Right Brain Productions, and MTVarts. In addition, she developed a giving circle of 100+ Women Who Care who are dedicated to raising funds for local charities. Marty has received recognition for her work. While working in her role on the Operations Board of the Mt. Vernon Music and Arts Festival in August 2021, she was surprised by Mayor Matt Starr who presented her with the key to the city to honor her service to the community as an educator and artist. It was the first time in a decade for the honor to be bestowed. Additionally, she was honored by the local chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution in March of 2022 for her service to the community.

Marty is married to husband Joe

Marty is a member of the Gay Street United Methodist Church where she serves in the chancel choir and as the children's choir accompanist.

Marty enjoys travel, reading, and her community activities. Martha Strauch Bell's service to Morrow and Knox Counties is an extension of her upbringing in North Canton. The Logan Family Foundation



Inspired to “pay forward,” the Logan Family Foundation was founded in 2004. Since its inception, the Foundation has hosted charitable events – often with notable honorary chairs – to raise money for dozens of deserving charities. To date, the Foundation has awarded almost \$1,000,000.

The foundation was inspired by the life lessons of the board's parents, Dick and Gloria Logan. The family

has been blessed with sports and life success and is determined to “pay forward” to families and children in the communities where they live.

Dick played football for The Ohio State University – Woody Hayes became his coach his senior year - and for the Green Bay Packers. In 1975, he invested in a sporting goods store in North Canton in order to free up his time to watch son Jeff play football at Ohio State. Gloria, a former Hall of Distinction Inductee, worked at the store as well.

Dick passed away in November 2016 just hours after watching a Buckeye victory over That Team Up North and Gloria continues to support the Foundation, providing feedback and ideas. Gloria remains a great source of inspiration to the family.

The Foundation's Board is made up of Dick and Gloria's adult children: Jeff Logan, a successful Buckeye currently living in Delaware, Ohio; Whit Logan, an outstanding high school athlete and successful businessman in Upper Arlington; Andy Logan, a Kent State football player and current proprietor of Logan's Sporting Goods; Amy Logan Walther, considered the MVP of the family; and Jill Logan, the widow of 4-time Olympian and former Hall of Distinction Inductee Jud Logan.

Each recognizes the lessons of their parents. Additionally, there are 11 grandchildren with successful careers in education, healthcare, business, public relations, and college and professional sports who are poised to continue the work of the foundation.

Sadly, Jud passed away in January 2022 following a battle with

COVID-19. He articulated his parents' lessons in his 2020 Commencement address to the graduates of Ashland University. He emphasized the need to find and be a mentor in order to give light to others. Furthermore, he lived his motto of “what he had he gave and what you keep is lost forever.”

The premier fundraising event of the foundation is its annual charity sports celebrity golf outing, dinner, and auction. Each year the event has an honorary chair to help raise interest and awareness. Former chairs have included Buckeye head coaches Urban Meyer, Jim Tressel, and Earle Bruce, two-time Heisman trophy winner Archie Griffin, record setting Mount Union Football Coach Larry Kehres, sports analysts Todd Blackledge and Clark Kellogg, and other successful players and coaches from Kent State, Ohio State, and Ashland Universities. They attempt to put a sports celebrity with each foursome so that participants “get to know a coach, a player, or Olympian.”

There are nearly 110 organizations to whom the foundation has paid forward. Some of the most notable include the YMCA where Dick was on the board, a wide variety of North Canton sport and academic programs, Ashland City Schools and Ashland University, several Children's Hospital Foundations and wish-granting organizations, The James Cancer Hospital at Ohio State, food banks, Rotary organizations, and a wide variety of other deserving groups. The Foundation is excited to be approaching

Bina Mehta



Bina Mehta has had a lifelong goal to help people – not only through medicine, but diet, exercise and positive lifestyle changes. As a result, she is a leading physician in reducing the reliance on opiates for pain management.

Bina and her identical twin sister, Lina, were born in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, to Indian parents and moved to North Canton when she was 3, and her father, a pathologist, was offered a Visa and a position at Aultman Hospital. The Mehtas chose North Canton Schools for their four children because of its stellar reputation. In third grade, Bina became a U.S. citizen and her entire girl scout troop attended the naturalization ceremony. While in high school, Bina was active in Student Council and choir and especially the band– she loved Friday nights! She graduated in 1987.

Both Bina and Lina attended

Northeastern Ohio Medical University – known then as NEOUCOM – to complete their accelerated Bachelor of Science and Medical Doctor program. She completed her internship and residency in physical medicine and rehabilitation at Metrohealth Medical Center where she served as chief resident.

After completing her residency, Bina started her own medical practice, Western Reserve Spine and Pain Institute in Kent, Ohio, with her partner, Dr. David Leone. From the beginning, it was an innovative practice. Dr. Leone, a chiropractor and acupuncturist, complemented her experience to create a multi-specialty group of healthcare providers whose goal was treat the patient as a whole, under one roof. They focus on helping patients minimize pain, maximize function, and reduce medication. This was especially innovative in 1998 considering the medical trend at the time was to increase the use of opioids like OxyContin.

In its 25 years, the Spine and Pain Institute has become one of the largest multi-specialty practices in the country. Regionally, the Institute manages non-surgical musculoskeletal services for the Cleveland Clinic Foundation at 8 locations. Additionally, Bina and her consulting company have worked with hospitals and private practices throughout the country. She is a Clinical Assistant Professor at her alma mater, Northeastern Ohio Medical University, as well as Heritage Osteopathic Medical School at Ohio University. She is passionate about teaching others

how to effectively treat pain. Bina has several publications to her credit.

Bina is a Fellow of the American Academy of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation. She is a member of the American Association of Neuromuscular and Electrodiagnostic Medicine, the Ohio State Medical Association, and the American Academy of Pain Management.

Bina currently lives in Chagrin Falls, Ohio, with her three children. She has 17-year-old twins – a fraternal brother and sister – and a 20-year old daughter. She enjoys yoga, fitness training, traveling, playing the piano, and reading.

Bina Mehta is a physician, innovator, entrepreneur, and educator who was ahead of her time in providing the best treatment to her patients and all of Northeast Ohio. The North Canton Alumni Association is pleased to have her as a recipient in its Hall of Distinction.

Kyle Putinski

Kyle was born February 25, 1984, to Michael and Linda Putinski. He attended North Canton Schools and graduated from Hoover High school in 2003. While a teen, he earned the rank of Eagle Scout. After graduation, he attended the University of Akron where he majored in History and Education.

He worked briefly as a substitute teacher in Copley-Fairlawn Schools before branching out to his work in social services. His work has primarily focused on supporting the socio-emotional and educational needs of children and the struggles of families in generational poverty. He has served as a job training specialist, a community relations representative for Goodwill Industries of Akron, and created a GED curriculum for Getting Ahead. He had several responsibilities for the United Way of Summit County and the United Way of Wayne and Holmes Counties including the popular Bridges Out of Poverty workshops and the Wayne County Opiate Taskforce.

In 2018, he became the Regional Director of Community Engagement for the Educational Empowerment Group, and, in 2020, he became the Executive Director of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Summit, Medina, and Stark Counties. This organization serves over 350 children aged 6-18. Kyle not only works with people in poverty, but looks at poverty from a systemic standpoint – addressing not only the needs of children but of the whole community.

Kyle has been active in the community in other ways as well. He is a founding member of the Summit County Mentoring Collaborative. He has many


community connections such as the Akron Rotary and the Summit County Clerk of Courts who is a supporter of Big Brothers Big Sisters. He was an Ally in Summit County Circles from 2016-18 and is currently on the Give It Away team of Grace Church's Bath Campus.

Kyle has been honored for his service. In 2021, he was named one of 30 for the Future by the Greater Akron Chamber. He is a graduate of Leadership Wooster in 2016 and the First Class of Big Brothers Big Sisters of America Leadership Institute as of this year.

Kyle and his wife, Emily, live in Copley and have three sons – Owen, Noah, and Luke. He enjoys powerlifting, reading, camping, home improvements, and going to amusement parks with his family.

Kyle Putinski has been an asset to the Northeast Ohio community. The North Canton Alumni Association is pleased to have him as a recipient in its Hall of Distinction.

Handy B. Wolf



With roots in North Canton's earliest history, Handy B. Wolf served his nation, his community, and his students admirably.

Handy was born in 1924 in his childhood home on 6th Street in

North Canton to Grover and Lillian Wolf. Grover was a disabled WWI veteran and Lillian worked for Boss Hoover at the Hoover Company. The Wolf family settled in New Berlin in the early 1800s. Handy's grandfather established the town print shop and both his father and uncle served in North Canton's government. Handy attended the Portage Street School and No-Ca-Hi. In addition to serving on student council and performing in the choir and senior play, he was a standout athlete at No-Ca-Hi – he was a 3-year letterman in football and basketball with All-County and All-District awards - and he met his wife, Marillyn, in the 9th grade. Handy graduated in 1942.

World War II interrupted Handy's college career. He – along with all 3 of his siblings – served in the military. He went to basic training in 1943 and became a member of the 86th BlackHawk Infantry Division in Patton's 3rd Army in France, Belgium, and Germany. He was awarded the Purple Heart, the Bronze Star, his Combat Infantry Badge, and a European Theater Ribbon.

After returning from the war, Handy earned his Bachelor of Science in Education from Muskingum College in 1948. He began his teaching career as a science teacher at Jefferson High School in Dresden, Ohio, but quickly moved to New Concord High School where he taught science, was the head coach for basketball and baseball and an assistant football coach, and lived in John Glenn's childhood home. In 1957, Handy moved

home and took a job at Glenwood High School. He earned his Masters of Education from Kent State University in 1960.

Handy spent 21 years as an administrator in the Plain Local Schools. He began as an assistant principal at Glenwood High School before becoming principal of Glenwood High School, Oakwood High School, and eventually oversaw the combination of the two into GlenOak. Handy was a 48-year supporter of Plain Local Schools where he worked on operating levies, bond issues, scholarships, and coordinated student activities with community groups like the Elks, Rotary Club, and American Legion. He retired in 1981.

Handy was equally involved in the North Canton community. He was an active member and president of the Rotary Club and an active member of the Hoover Lodge #770, the Tadmor Shrine, the North Canton Elks Lodge, and the North Canton Booster Club. He was an active supporter of his children's and grandchildren's activities in the North Canton Schools. He was a lifetime member of the North Canton School Alumni Association. He served the larger community as a lifetime member, secretary, treasurer, and president of the McKinley Chapter of Phi Delta Kappa. He was a 21-year member of the Stark County and Federal Athletic Leagues. He was a life member and 32nd degree Mason and a Charter Member of the Lions Club.

For a lifetime that speaks volumes about his character and contribution, Handy has received honors and recognition. He received the Paul

Harris Fellow Award by Rotary International for furthering positive relations in addition to the Arden Basinger Award from the North Canton Rotary for his work supporting Polio-Plus, a global immunization effort. He received the Kappan Award for Distinguished Service to Education in 1981. In 2005, he was inducted into the Plain Local Alumni Hall of Distinction, and, in 2011, he was inducted into the John Glenn High School Athlete Hall of Fame. He's been recognized for support by the Plain Local Food Service Restaurant Co-op, VICA, DECCA, Future Farmers of America, and the Plain Local choir and band. He received a Congratulatory Citation from the Stark County Board of Education.

Handy and his wife Marilyn were married for 67 years. Their sons Tim and Thomas graduated from Hoover High School in 1969 and 1971. Their 4 grandchildren attended North Canton Schools, and they had 6 great-grandchildren.

Handy's first church was Community Christian in North Canton where Boss Hoover was his Sunday School teacher. He and Marilyn were married in Trinity Lutheran Church in Canton and attended there beginning in 1957. Handy served on Church Council and as a Sunday School teacher. Handy died in 2013. Prior to his death, he continued to be an active supporter and attendee of school functions. He also loved to golf, travel, and work with photography. Handy B. Wolf's diligent efforts in serving the children of our community are a tribute to his character. It is with great satisfaction

that the Alumni Association welcomes him into its Hall of Distinction.




